Time Management



Managing time is equivalent to managing one's life-style

Let's start with a set of commonly observed stuff among people:

- Finishing work late
- Submitting work that is not up to the usual standard
- Forgetting commitments
- Attending classes/meetings late regularly
- Finding that often you don't have enough time to complete a task
- Making excuses for why work is not done in time
- Asking teachers to extend the deadline for submission of assignments

If any one of the above is true for you, then probably you need to manage your time better. So, possibly this article would be helpful to you.

Managing time is equivalent to managing one's life-style. Time is one of the scarce resources that a person have. Important resource must be managed properly in order to get maximum benefit out of it. There have been so many successful people in the history. The difference between those people and the people in the common category is that the first category's people have utilized their time in the best possible manner. It may be remembered that everybody has 24 hours a day, 7 days a week and 30 days a month, etc. How to utilize this amount of time, which is equal for all, as said above, makes the ultimate difference.

It is widely known that time is an amanah given to

a human being from the Creator Allah (swt). Allah (swt) revealed a complete surah (Surah Al-Asr) in the name of time. In a hadith Prophet Muhammad (saw) said that on the Day of Judgement, children of Adam (as) will not be able to step forward, until he/she answers five questions. One of these is how he/she spent his/her lifetime in the world. We do not know how much time has been given to us (i.e. our life time) in the world. Then it goes without any argument that we must utilise our time so that we can be successful in this world as well as hereafter. In the following, we have provided a number of tips, aimed at maximising our productivity and benefits.

Self- motivation: We do not need to go that far to find out that every great person, regardless of their area of achievement had a mission in his/her life. The person has worked very hard to realise this mission. Constant pushing someone may not lead the person achieving excellent results. Motivation must come from within. If you are a student, you need to have the self-motivation that you will achieve excellent results in examinations, as many things in later life depend upon academic excellence. Or if you are a businessman, you need to have self-motivation, that one day you will be able to setup a multinational company. Charles Garfield, a noted thinker found one thing common among the world class athletes, who have broken world records or world class business people who have achieved extraordinary business results, that they share extraordinary reserves of energy and they are passionately committed to a mission. One recent example is world renowned sprinter Usain Bolt of Jamaica, who made 'triple triple' in the just concluded Olympic games at Rio de Janeiro. This extraordinary achievement has been possible due to his extraordinary, unfathomable self-motivation.

Have a list of goals: Captain of a ship sails it towards a pre-decided destination. Reaching the destination is his

goal. In the absence of this goal, which direction the captain would sail? You need to have a list of goals that you want to achieve in the short as well as long run. The goals should be SMART (specific, measurable, attainable, realistic and time-based). List down these goals on a plain paper. Read it often. Develop and workout strategies which will help realising those goals. Implementation of these strategies is actually our day to day activities.

Have a to-do list: One day can be considered as a unit in our life. If we can effectively pass one day, one week, one month, then probably we are going to succeed in our life. There are possibly so many things that can be done in weeks time. Prepare a list of all the activities for a week. For a student, these can comprise the tasks related to several subjects including studying the topic, solving exercise problems or doing some projects. Whatever be your profession, you should list down all the activities that need to be carried out, say in next one week time. This list is called to-do-list. It can be done manually or using some device such as smart phone. Further remember that, a to-do list is actually a list of short-term as well as long-term planned activities.

Prioritization: It is necessary but not sufficient to have a list of activities. This list must be prioritized into three categories:

- Category A: Must do
- Category B: Should do
- Category C: Can do

As it sounds, the tasks in Category A must be done first. It may take one day or few days to complete all these activities. The Category A tasks must be updated constantly. That is, revise category B activities often and see whether time has come to promote some tasks from B to A. Same goes for the promotion of the tasks in Category C to Category B. Note that this is a dynamic process that needs to be done continuously.

Planning, Planning, and Planning: It is not that you only plan for the number of activities, you also need to plan how you will carry out those activities. Alan Lakein said that failing to plan is equivalent to planning to fail. If you are a



student and you know you have exam after two months, so, you need to develop a plan how you will complete your preparation within this two months. Sometimes, Gantt chart is useful to put the main activities in writing along with their corresponding start and finish times.

Hardest thing first: One particular day's to-do list should be prepared in the preceding evening or latest by the morning of the particular day. It is extremely important to spend few minutes to prepare the list. This is essential for time management. This is to ensure that we do not forget to carry out some essential activity in that particular day. So, when the day begins, we have a list of activities. Which activity should be done first? Some say, well, we should begin the day by doing the most important task. True, but there is another suggestion from many experts. According to them, first of all we should carry out the toughest task (which is also an important one that should be done in that particular day) in the beginning of the day. The rationale is, once the task is done, we can exhale a sigh of relief. The rest of the tasks can be done one after another more comfortably.

One task at a time: While some people may think that multi-tasking increases productivity, but actually it is not. Multi-tasking may lead to loss of focus and quality of outputs of the tasks may be inferior. Imagine that someone is on phone call and at the same time he is typing a memo. Often we have experienced this in a typical office environment. How can a person concentrate on talking as well as typing at the same time? There is enough possibility of making mistakes in both cases. Note that it is illegal



as well as dangerous to attend phone call while someone is driving. World famous management Guru Peter Drucker said that multitasking requires 20% more time to complete the tasks compared to doing one task at a time. Engage your full energy, have your total concentration in doing one activity, finish it and then start the next one.

No Procrastination: Procrastination means postponing some activity which is supposed to be completed. In general, procrastination of activity is considered as bad. If it is repeatedly postponed, the activity may emerge as a nightmare. People postpone it due to a possible reason that the task is difficult or requires a long time to finish. Remember that the task may be difficult but if it is important, it must be done. So, better to do it as soon as possible. Again, if you are repeatedly postponing it, then there is a tip for you which is known as “15 minutes rule”. This means that you just start the work and think that, well, I am not going to finish it today, but I will do the work just for 15 minutes. You will see that this is a head start of the work and very soon you will see there is a good headway in completing the task. The choice is yours whether you want to postpone the work for a long time or just start and do it for 15 minutes. It may happen that the work may take much less time compared to what you originally thought and there is enough possibility that the work will be completed soon.

Time Log: It is not essential but possibly important for some people. If you think that most of the time you feel too busy but at the end of the day you feel that you have not achieved much and your output is mediocre compared to many people, then possibly, you are spending too much of your time in unproductive activities. So, the advice for you is that you take a paper and a pencil and start writing your daily activities on the paper. This means that you write down what you did in the morning hour, then next and so on. Do it for all the days of two weeks. Then check carefully the logbook and see where actually you are spending your time. Ask yourself, if I don't do this, what will happen? If the answer is ‘nothing’, then next time better don't do it. In essence, you need to find out your own time wasters and use this time for more productive activities which are more rewarding.

Time wasters: One of the important things in time management is that we identify our time wasters. Time log will help to identify those. This may come in the form of some activities that are “excessive” prefixed, i.e., excessive phone calls, excessive dealings with Facebook or excessive socializing. While some sort of socializing is good and recommended but excessive socializing consumes a lot of time. Another big waster is gossiping or watching television program that are not that educative. It is recommended that you call people one after another on a particular time or you can open your e-mail box and reply e-mail at particular time of a day. This will enforce more control on your ancillary activities. Remember, if you are a student, time for study is more important than any other activity (except observing religious obligation such as salat). Of course, I do not mean that after salat you only study, study and study. No, that is not the case. You also need to relax possibly engaging yourself in some physical activity such as games or sports. Light physical activity at the designated time of a day invigorates the whole body and sharpens minds.

A polite ‘No’: You maybe already overburdened but new things/requests keep on coming. Perhaps you have reached at the time to politely refuse, just saying no. It is better to say no rather than not being able to complete the task in time or worse yet completing the task with inferior quality. This will also enable you to focus more on the tasks at your hand. We should not be that kind of person who always says ‘yes’ and then disappears from the scene.

Delegate tasks often: This is especially true for managers or administrators. In fact, it is true for many other kinds of people. If you are spending too much of your time on activities which other people should be doing, then possibly you will not get time to do your core activities. But important thing to remember is that the task needs to be delegated to the right person who has the necessary skills to carry out the task effectively. In management theory, this is considered as some sort of recognition of the person's skills. Delegating task is a good time management tip as by doing so your overall productivity level can reach to a greater height. So, delegate as many tasks as possible. But ironically, this may not be fully applicable to students as they have to learn all the topics by themselves! Finally a cautionary note, it is an important decision making task whether one particular job should be delegated or not.

Important vs. Urgent works: 34th American President Dwight D. Eisenhower said all the works that are considered as urgent may not be deemed to be important. Stephen R. Covey, a celebrated management guru devised a matrix (a 2-dimensional dia-



gram) that puts all types of activities into two categories: Important and Urgent. The design of the matrix is the following:

Many times, people are obsessed to carry out urgent works leaving the important ones. However, if the urgent works have low importance, then those may be considered as interrupters. Perhaps you can negotiate about the delayed deadlines of those acts, if that is at all possible. To maximise our productivity and achieving our life goals, we should be paying more attention to the important tasks. To do this, obviously, first of all we need to assign the levels of urgency and importance to all our tasks.

Pacing: Pacing means to keep buffer time for some activity. For example if your examination duration is three hours, you assume that your exam time is not three hours but two hours and 50 minutes. And put all your efforts so that you can finish by two hours and 50 minutes. Similarly, if your deadline is 30th of September, you assume that your deadline is say 28th of September and have plan to finish by this time. The extra buffer time of two days will allow you to accommodate any eventuality that may emerge in course of doing the task.

Use planners: Use of planners is essential for a person who have to carry out many types of activities. As and when the tasks come, this should be entered at the right date (specifying the time as well) of the planner. However, only important activities are to be entered into the planner. Small-small or petty tasks can come into the to-do list. Do not forget to browse through your planner often.

Physical Organization: Be wary about cluttered table. This needs to be put in order. The reason is simple. Searching an important document which is on your table but since there are so many things, sometimes it is hard to find it. So you lose some time and this kind of search



might affect the smooth rhythm of workflow. So arrange the stuff nicely and put on the table in order.

Make use of your waiting time: Everybody experiences waiting time: while to catch a train or bus or flight or at a government office. Especially, if you are waiting to get your connecting flight, you may have to wait for a long time, sometimes 7 or 8 hours. Always carry something useful with you, be it within your smartphone apps or clipping of important newspaper articles or simply may be funny story book. Further, you may know that in some particular day you may have some waiting time, so plan a priori how you are going to utilise this time. Use your waiting time by reading the material that you carry or simply do zikr of Allah (swt). For students, you can use your break time or time between two classes by reading or discussing something useful. As said earlier, time is an amanah, you need to respect it through proper and productive utilisation.

Punctuality: This is one of the great human qualities. Punctuality is the bedrock of time management. How many times you have seen that the meeting or the seminar did not start in time? Remember that when you are supposed to attend a meeting at 10 o'clock, be there at 9.55 am (pacing concept). If you think that you will reach exactly at 10 o'clock, most probably you will be late for few minutes, as we live in an uncertain world; you may get an important phone call or may meet some friend on the way that may make you late. Do not ever think that, ok, the meeting time is 10 o'clock but I know it will not begin before 10.10, so better I reach at 10.10. No, it is wrong to think in that way. Forget others, just do your job,



i.e., to arrive at the meeting venue no later than 9.55 am.

Put things in writing: We listen many things from many people. Put in writing some useful information that is expected to be referred in future. Otherwise you may forget those or you have to spend a plenty of time to recover those. So it will save your time if you develop your habit to put useful information or even new ideas in writing. My friend Professor Thomas Saaty of University of Pittsburgh once said that some night he needs to get up 2-3 times from sleep to put in writing new research ideas that may instantly crop up in his mind even in midnight. This is very true, as his busy mind might forget in the morning what ideas came into his mind in the midnight!

Reduce absent-mindedness: This is easier said than done. This is one of real problems of mine. To certain extent, all of us are absent-minded. In many cases, it happens that we lose inordinate amount of time in looking for stuff which we misplaced. This loss of time can be minimised if we place stuff to its designated location. It is said that we the human beings have our own houses; similarly, everything else has its own house. So, put the stuff in its own 'house' and while searching for it, be in its house. Further, keeping calm and coolness in mind and focusing one work or one thinking at a time, can reduce absent-mindedness.

Exercise, good sleep and healthy diet: Are these also related to time management? Yes, in a big way. Some of my friends once lamented that we don't have time to do physical exercise, but have enough time to be on hospital bed, unfortunately. Obviously, good sleep and healthy diet are also necessary to keep our brain fresh and body fit. A healthy body is essential to concentrate on our activities so that these activities can be completed at

a minimum amount of time and with impeccable quality.

Miscellaneous: Following are some extra tips:

Arrive mosque early for jamah prayer and pray with full concentration with utmost humility.

Do not forget to spend your quality time with your family members and visiting sick relatives.

Minimise watching television.

Gossiping – absolutely no. That does not mean that you do not need to have leisure time. Rather, to energise yourself, you need to have leisure time but use it prudently.

Go to bed at a reasonably fixed time of night and also get up at the same time in the morning.

Try to schedule all your phone calls (except emergency ones) at a particular time of a day.

In order to avoid disturbance in doing some important work, either switch off or put your mobile phone in silent mode.

Have a wall-clock in front of you.

Attend any activity with full preparation, that is, a student should attend a class after pre-class reading on the topic to be discussed in the class.

Be flexible so that eventualities can be accommodated in your schedule.

Spend about 10 minutes at the beginning of your day on what activities from your to-do list you intend to carry out in that day, sequence them and start doing one by one.

In conclusion, managing time is equivalent to managing one's life and a life is a full of activities. It is hoped that the tips discussed in this article can help in carrying out our day-to-day activities so that we can attain our ultimate success in both worlds. However, success does not come overnight; it requires a meticulous plan and its execution with patience, persistence, and perseverance. ■

The maxim 'your setback is the platform for your comeback' goes well with the life trajectory of Md Sohel Rana.

Sohel is from Shibnagar village under Domkal thana, Murshidabad. Unlike other villages of the district, Shibnagar has a high percentage of literacy rate and the economic conditions of the villagers are also good. Most of them have pucca house.

Sohel's family too had a steady financial background. They had the biggest house in the village. His grandfather was a religious person and had performed Hajj, thus becoming a Haji. His eldest uncle was a school teacher, another one is a Ration dealer. Sohels father Md Johurul Haque is a business person. He has read till B.Com 3rd year, while his mother Selina Bibi has passed Madhyamik. Sohel is the eldest son. He has a brother, Jewel Washif, who has done M.A in English and does a job in Panchayet. Her sister Shifa Khatun has also completed MA and teaches in a B.Ed College.

He was well off financially. But as a student he was mediocre. He used to make average results in classes. He began his study in a nondescript primary school in

the village, where students of class I and II had to study in the shadows of mango trees with tattered sacks spread on the dusty ground. To get inside the two room pucca house, one had to pass class II. After class III, Soheli moved to Shibnagar Primary School. This was much better than the former. Also it had a high school in its periphery.

Let me narrate the story of his admission to Al-Ameen Mission. One of his relatives, Murshid Sarwar, was a student of Al-Ameen Mission. Every year he used to distribute admission forms of the Mission in his locality. Once, after distributing the form, he saw that there was still one left. After some thought he gave that remaining form to Soheli's father. After filling it up, Johurul Saheb took his son to Khalatpur. Soheli sat for the examination and successfully got admission in the Mission.

Thus his hostel life began. It was 1994. Al-Ameen Mission had yet to spread its wings. Khalatpur was the only campus of the Mission at that time. There was a two story building. Students used to stay in the second floor of the Madrasah building and ate in the verandah. By the way, Soheli's first namaz was performed wearing a half pant. But he soon learns how to offer it. At that time, there were about three hundred students. In class V, twenty three students were studying. In a room, 12 students used to stay. In a double bed, usually three students had to be accommodated.

Foods were simple. Smashed potato with a dash of lemon was a much sought after dish. There was another way to make smashed potato much tastier i.e. to make the cook angry. To vent his anger, the cook used to smash the potato even harder. The texture of the potato

used to get finer and the dish used to get tastier. Entertainments were limited. The 12 boys staying in room no 17 had a quiz association. That room was named RAJA SANKARAN with initial letters from the name of each boy. Also the boys were very fond of sports. Soheli had a knack for sports. He even played in the district level. Whenever anything related to sports came up, it was Soheli who took the initiative to implement it. Rarely did they have opportunities to see movies. There was no easy access to see it either at that time. But sometimes, may be once or twice in a year, they were allowed to see movies in a rented VCD with special permission from the general secretary. Although, students had to donate Rs 1 for this entertainment, the Secretary Sir was instrumental in choosing the movie.

In the meantime, Soheli's study continued. But his performance was not up to the mark. Each year, when the result was announced, his name used to come after 10 or 12 students. He hoped that he would at least get star marks in the Madhyamik. When the result of Madhyamik (10th) was announced, he was in his home. He was so confident about his result that he bought a packet of sweets. After buying it, he called the Mission from a phone booth to know about his results and he was jolted when he heard that his percentage of marks is 68, not even a star marks. He had to return to his home walking on an embankment. But he was so shocked that he did not know what to do. He was sitting by the road with packets of sweets in his hand. At that moment, he saw a girl of his locality. She was going to her in-law house. She came from a poor family. Soheli gave away the sweets to her.

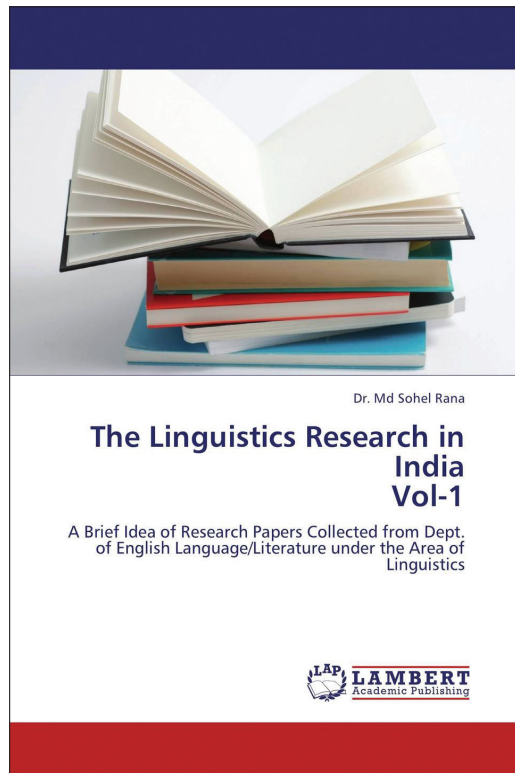
That was the beginning of Soheli's misery. He took science and started studying in Khalatpur again. But he soon realised, science was getting tough for him. He could not cope with the subjects. Realising this, he went to meet the general secretary for consultation. He said that if you can't do well in the science stream, then it is better to switch over to arts stream. Soheli took a decision. If at all he has to continue study in the arts stream, it is better to do it from home. After spending six years in Khalatpur, he left the campus.

Tears rolled down his cheeks. But at the same time, he became determined. His father was by his side. While traveling on the bus, his father looked at his painful face and said, "Don't be disappointed. What will be, will be, whether you study from the Mission or from

anywhere else.” This consolation became his only refuge to move ahead.

Returning home, deliberations began. After some thought and with advice from Bajit Hos-sain, head master of Sadi Khan Diyar Vidyapith, Soheli took Agriculture as his main subject. He got admitted in a school, which was 25 km away from home. The distance of Domkal Bazar from his home was 10 km. Soheli's father had a store there. He still vividly remembers his first day to school from home. He got a seat in the bus and started remembering his days at the Mission. Returning home, he wrote a letter to the general secretary. In this letter he wrote, Rohon-Nowroj would become doctors or engineers. What will Soheli do? If I can't do anything, how can I go to the Mission again? I am promising you I will do my best from here.

Thus, a new life began and the struggle had only started. But Soheli got his parents by his side. They too sacrificed a lot. After a few days, it was decided that he would stay in the store at Domkal Bazar. His parents too decided to come and stay with him in the two room store. One of the rooms was allotted to him. Soheli also urged that while studying, there should be no noise. His parents, seeing the devotion of their son, tried their best to maintain silence inside the house. He also told his father to wake him up at four in the morning. But he himself used to get up at 3.30 and began to study. Every day, his father used to go to wake him up. But he used to see that his son has already woken up and is reading. Johurul Saheb told him to study 16 hours a day. But despite his best efforts, he could not study more than 12 hours. But his father was satisfied. For two years, he continued studying like this minus any kind of entertainment.



seats are allotted to Agriculture students out of 30 seats. This was so unexpected to Soheli. He broke into tears. He went to Berhampore Krishna Nath College and fill up the form for English Honours. But he was listed after 90 students. There were only 25 seats. On the day of the counseling, he and his mother went to the college. His father was skeptical. But, when the name calling came down to 85, Soheli began shivering. He realised that he has not brought his admit card and mark sheet. That his name will be called was totally unexpected to him. After narrating the whole incident, he got admitted.

The first one year went wasted. Initially, for four months he was ragged. Soheli used to stay in the Kumar Hostel, beside the college. The boys of this hostel were notorious. They used to

do all kinds of misdeeds. Study went haywire. But in the second year, an incident took place which marked the turning point of Soheli's career. One of his college friends, Kasem obtained two admission forms of Aligarh Muslim University. One was for himself. Kasem gave the other one to Soheli as he was available at that moment. Soheli took the form to Alamgir Biswas. Alamgir, an alumnus of AMU was a teacher of Krishnanath College. He advised Soheli to keep English as the first preference, the second preference should be Geography and Linguistics should be third preferred subject. In AMU, after one year of study one can change subjects. After some days, Soheli got the news that he has got a chance in the Linguistics. So, he went to AMU. Already two years had gone wasted. The first time when he got admission in Class V instead of Class VI in Al-Ameen Mission and now one year went wasted in Krishna Nath College. But it was a boon in disguise. In AMU, one can study spending less amount

He used to come first in the class test. There were 72 students in their class. In 2001 HS exam, he secured 71 per cent marks. But when he went to Kalyani University, he again got a jolt when he learned that only three

of money. But the problem was different. He decided that in the second year, he will change the subject. Although, Linguistics had high demand abroad, in India it is difficult to get a job. So that year when everyone

wanted to switch over to different departments, the Linguistics department was at the verge of collapsing. The administration of the University took an unprecedented decision- no students of Linguistics department can switch over to different departments. This was another jolt for Soheli. In 2005, after securing 65.7 per cent marks, he became a graduate. After graduating, he again thought of doing post graduate with a different subject. But his father gave him a wise advice. He said, you should continue with the same subject. Go till you reach the goal. So, in 2007, he completed masters in Linguistics with 72.14% marks. Now he had two options- to appear for NET or

enroll for a PhD programme. There were four seats available. He ranked four for the programme. He started his research under the supervision of AR Fatehi, the head of the department. Soheli had two years to finish the research. For the initial year, Professor Fatehi did not say a word. He only said, collect materials and study. Soheli delved into the subject straightaway. Every day he went to the sprawling library of AMU. He began collecting numerous materials like previous research works, books etc. During this period, the guide and the researcher used to meet every day. But they did not exchange any words. Professor Fatehi opened the gate at 9 in the morning. Soheli used to arrive just a minute earlier and stand in front of the gate. After a year, Prof Fatehi asked Soheli to give him a list of books he had read the past year. After getting the list, he asked what he had found in those books. The Professor got a good reply. Satisfied he asked Soheli to prepare the research paper. The title of the paper would be, 'Conversional Clause as a major of Oral Ability'. In the second year he got a fellowship from Central Institute of Indian Language, Mysore in Karnataka. Throughout India, 53 researchers applied for the fellowship. Eleven got the chance, Soheli was one of them. This institute is the largest language research centre of India. The Fellowship was of Rs ten thousand. But he also got the opportunity to see vast numbers of qualitative research papers in that institute.

His research was going on. It was still not over. One day, Professor Fatehi called Soheli over phone. When he visited the Professor, he gave him a number and told him to go to Delhi. Jazan University of Saudi Arabia will take instructor. Officials from the University were visiting Delhi for recruitment. Prof Fatehi told Soheli to meet them for interview. Soheli went to Delhi and

gave the interview and was selected. Soheli returned to Aligarh and informed his Professor, who asked him, "do you want to do job or PhD?" Soheli replied that he want to finish his research. Dr Fatehi said, "ask your family." The salary was Rs 80 thousand per month. But Soheli's father instructed him to continue his PhD. Soheli informed Jazan University that he will join after six months after finishing the PhD. The University agreed.

Meanwhile, the first PhD candidate under Professor Fatehi's supervision and now a professor at Michigan State University, Syed Ektiar Ali was visiting India for four months. Professor Fatehi asked him to help Soheli finishing his research quickly.

Ektiar helped him to prepare his research paper. At last, in 2010, Soheli finished his research. He became the first person to complete PhD from Al-Ameen Mission. The day he got the degree he called someone in the afternoon. That someone was none other than the general secretary of the Mission, M Nurul Islam to whom he had vowed to do something worthwhile once upon a time. Soheli had not visit the Mission for 12 years. After a while, the Mission invited him to come to attend a function. He had been waiting for that phone for many years. Now, he can visit. At last, he had become someone amidst a crowd of doctors and engineers. But his goal was fulfilled when he joined the Jazan University. He could not join that University as an instructor but next year he gave another interview and joined it as an assistant professor. The salary was much higher than that of an instructor.

A German publisher has already published four books of Soheli. He has also written many articles and papers in various international journals and magazines. He has joined seminars in Thailand, Dubai, Japan and Russia. He has achieved the "Best Academic Teaching Awards" from the Jazan University in 2014. But he has got the lifetime achievement award from Al-Ameen Mission. This was the place which he left one day shedding tears. Today, he is selling his dream. He says, "Don't get disheartened if you can't study science, if you fail to clear JEE, there are many things in this earth you can achieve. Life is bigger than becoming a doctor, an engineer or a professor. If you want to achieve something in life, don't cheat yourself. Honest effort will not go in vain because life will not cheat you." Soheli Rana has found his path. If his story inspires a single person, it will, doubtless, be a big achievement. ■

But also her parents' blessings and Allah's grace have been a big help. Quite often, she feels lonely in the hostel remembering her parents. Looking at the night sky, she wonders whether that star is her father, another one her mother and the little star must be his younger sister. But instantly, she reminds herself that she has to shine like the star and delves into study. Jasmine wants to be a doctor. Politics attracts her, but 'politics' at the real sense of the term. She feels through practicing it properly she can serve the society in a much better way. She loves playing badminton. She has also developed taste for good cinema and songs.

Ramiz passed the admission test and got admitted in class IX in the Bel-danga branch. In 2015, he appeared for the Madhyamik and secured 599 marks. He got highest marks in Life Science (94 marks). Life Science is his favourite subject. In leisure time, he loves to read Life Science. He dreams big. His aim is to research on Cancer.

Moments later, wiping out her tears she said in a hushed tone, sadness is the light towards the right path. Hope that light will lead her to a bright future.

Tamanna Malita: Tamanna studies in class XII in the Medinipur (Girls) branch. She was born in 1999. She

is from Ganganandapur village of North 24 Parganas. Her father Rafikul Islam Malita is an agricultural worker. He cultivates his own 3 bigha agricultural land. Of late her mother Nilufa Yasmin has become an ICDS worker. In 2000, her mud thatched house was swept away by flood water. From then on they used to live in a house whose walls were of bamboo sticks. Recently they have built a small house made of bricks. Tamanna is a newcomer to Al-Ameen. She was admitted here in class XI. Previously, she used to study in Ambikapur Altaf Hussain High school. That Al-Ameen nurture its student brilliantly, Tamanna could be a good example. She secured 550 marks (78 per cent). But after coming to the Mission, she stands first in all the class tests. She said, "My mentality has changed greatly. Before, I used to read mechanically. But now, the teachers guide me constantly. I read with great joy oblivious of time." Rakiba got her primary education in the village school. Her maternal uncle house was two and a half hour bus drive. Later on, she continued studying from there and passed the Madhyamik from Nimgram Beluri HS School. She appeared for the exam in 2015 and got 472 marks, which was slightly above 67 per cent. She got highest marks 80 in Life Sci-

ence. She has got admission in the Mission now but earlier she appeared for the admission in class VIII, which she failed. But she was determined to break the ice and ultimately she did. Why was Rakiba so determined to study in Al-Ameen Mission? Because from her maternal side at least five to six relatives are alumni of the Mission and they are the inspiration in front of her.

She does not like Mathematics. Her favorite subject is English. English has been her first love from her childhood. Rakiba wants to study English language and literature further and become a professor. This is her dream. This dreamy girl loves to read the poetry of Shelley, Keats and Wordsworth. In their poems, the glorification of nature and woman are very dear to her. She loves Rabindra Sangeet and the sad songs of contemporary Arijit Singh. She is fond of water. She wants to sit face to face with River Ganga and talk. She loves to get wet in the incessant rain too.

Firdous Sultana: Firdous Rakiba's classmate. She comes from the village Dhanai under Parui thana of Birbhum. The family has an educational background. Her father Mirza Alaaddin had done masters in History. Unfortunately, he died in 2013 due to pulmonary problems at a young age of 43. Firdous's mother Monirunnesa Begum has read till class XI. She is a homemaker. Her father was a farmer.

In spite of his post graduate degree, he never did a government job because he felt it a dishonest and utterly disrespectful to do a job in exchange of money. In six bigha cultivable land, the family, which is a joint family, earns their livelihood. Firdous read till class VIII in Parui and then she left for her maternal home in Boro Sija near Sainthia. She stayed there and passed the Madhyamik from a local school. Firdous had a flawed idea. She thought that to study in Al-Ameen, one had to spend lots of money. She filled up the admission form for class IX but retreated because of that flawed idea, which played in the back of her mind. But afterwards, she realised her mistakes and now she is a student here. Firdous is studying here free of cost. She is studying in the arts stream and in future she wants to go into administrative service. She thinks that by opting administrative service, she could serve the downtrodden people of the society well. Firdous yearns to travel. But till now she had not visited Kolkata. Once she had gone to Khalatpur via Kamarkundu. This much she has travelled so far. But in future after establishing herself, she will travel far and near. With this dream in mind, Firdous is preparing herself diligently. ■

Al-Ameen Mission:

‘...the success of the Mission Movement is a clear indication of the fact that reforms are emerging from within the community and hundreds of thousands of families are participating in the process.’

These words written down in a book only a few years ago point to the unambiguous fact that a change is palpably visible from within the Muslim community in West Bengal and Al-Ameen Mission is undeniably the change maker. The Mission is entering into the third decade of its journey and it is going strength to strength. It is fast turning into a place where dreams come true. It seems that the minority community of the state, which consists of about three crore people, is trying to make a turnaround with the help of this Mission. The vital question is whether the Mission is capable of taking up this challenge head on?

Going through some statistics, we can safely say that Al-Ameen Mission is coping rather successfully with this challenge. For example, in 2013 Madhyamik, Sk Shariatulla, having scored 666 (95.1%), stood first among the Mission students. In 2014, Rizia Sultana stood 13th in the state merit list with 670 (95.7%) marks. In 2015, Md Hasib Hossain scored 665 (95%) and was 19th in

the state merit list. But this year, a student broke the barrier after long time and was placed 10th in the merit list. He is **Saharuk Nawaz**.

Way back in 2007, Al-Ameen Mission made history when Mohammad Arif Shiekh topped the merit list. After a long gap, someone from the Mission had achieved that feat again. Although, each year, numerous students come within hundred ranks, it was a fact that for want of several marks, entry into the state merit list remained unachievable. But this year it is a different story. Not only does a boy entered into the merit list in the Madhyamik, in Higher Secondary too, a girl had made her entry to the honours list for the first time in Mission's history. Tahamina Parvin has been placed in the 6th rank and also Nazifa Nasrin has bagged 11th rank.

Let us now turn to the results of Madhyamik exami-

nation of 2016 in some details. From seventeen branches (12 boys' campus and 5 girls' campus) all total 778 students appeared for the examination. Throughout the state, 11 lakh 44 thousand 97 students sat for it. We have already mentioned the name of Saharuk, who have secured 10th rank in the merit list. He was the student in the Patharchapuri branch of the Mission and secured 674 marks. Saharuk is from Chhetiani, a village under Rejinagar Thana of Murshidabad district. He has studied in the Mission from class V. His father Najimuddin Sk is a temporary clerk in a school while his mother Shahnaz Begum is an accredited social health activist. Following him closely is **Ibtesam Farhad**, who studied from Khalatpur branch. She secured 672 marks and is placed in 12th position. She comes from Polsonda in Nadia district. She began studying in the Mission from class V. Her father Abdur Rakib Mondal is a petty businessman. He has a small cloth store in the village. Ibtesam's mother Sakina Bibi is a homemaker. Not only Saharuk or Ibtesam, there are about hundred students of the Mission who have got more than 90 per cent marks in the examination. There is a slight decline of number of students getting more than 90 per cent marks this year. But it should be noted that there is an overall decline in this segment throughout the state. The number of students in 'AA' (90 to 100%) has de-

creased to 12 thousand. There is also another interesting fact. Out of these hundred students, there are about 30 per cent girls. That a girl's education in a Muslim family is getting significance is amply manifested. 487 students have got 80 per cent while 748 students have secured 60 per cent marks.

We will now describe some of the struggles of the students who have passed the examination. Al-Ameen Mission has all along stood beside these students. This is a commitment; the Mission adheres to right from its inception. About 25 per cent students study here without paying fees. There are also numerous students whose fees are considerably slashed. Let's talk about Mahibur first. His full name is **Mahibur Rahaman Molla**. He comes from Bhatipota village of South 24 Parganas and was admitted in the Mission in Class VI. His father was with him when he was admitted. While staying in the Mission, he used to ring home whenever he felt unhappy. But he never talked to his father. Mahibur's mother used to say that his father has gone to work. During holiday, he visited his home

and came to know that his father is suffering from the fatal disease, cancer. His father left him soon. Mahibur became an orphan. But the Mission stood steadfastly beside him. Mahibur has got 91.5 per cent marks. He wants to be an oncologist in future. The reason is obvious.

Let us turn to **Rizwanuzzaman Molla** now, a boy from Barsory village in Birbhum district. He has lost his father. His mother gives tuition to little children and they have one bigha of cultivated land. Al-Ameen Mission not only took his responsibility but also took responsibility of the study of his younger brother.

Eyasmin Khatun wants to go in for research in Mathematics. She has got 93 per cent marks. Her father works in a shoe making factory and her mother is a cook in the ICDS project. Eyasmin, who was a student of Sarisha Ramakrishna Mission Sarada Mandir is now studying in the Al-Ameen Mission from class VII. Poverty could not stop her from dreaming big because the Mission is aiding her. She wants

to study mathematics and touch the sky.

Tahamina Khatun has got 92.1 per cent marks. She comes from Nabagram in Murshidabad. In future, she wants to be a doctor. Her father, Rejaul Haque studied till class VIII, while her mother is an illiterate. Tahamina's father runs his family selling fritters.

Now we move on to the results of the Higher Secondary examination. A record number of students appeared for this exam from the Mission in 2016. The number is 1553. For the last few years this number is gradually increasing. In 2013, it was 921. There was a significant increase in 2014- 1389 students. Last year the number rose to 1359. Also it should be mentioned in this context that the Mission has emphasised on the results of the HS exam because it builds up a student's career in a definitive way. If a student does good results, she/he would move in her/ his career path more smoothly. Besides science stream, the Mission is also taking students in the arts stream more and more, realising that these subjects could also fetch lucrative career. It has started arts department in the boys' campus. For the girls', however, three campuses have been chosen so far. Overall, 65 students appeared from the arts stream whereas 1488 appeared from the science stream. Out of these 1488 students, 988 were boys and 500 girls. 54 students have got over 90 per cent marks. 761 students

have got over 80 per cent marks while 1447 students secured more than 75 per cent. Out of these 1553 students, 1542 have passed in first division. This is indeed a remarkable achievement.

We have already mentioned that for the first time in Mission's history, a student has entered into the state merit list. Her name is **Tahamina Parvin** who comes from Boro Natabari, Coochbehar; a place which has neither good school nor good teachers. Her father is a small businessman. Tahamina has ranked 6th with 587 marks. First, let us look at her brilliant mark sheet-

Bengali- 97, English-85, Mathematics- 100, Physics- 97, Chemistry- 92 and Biology- 94.

What is the secret behind this glorious success? Tahamina's candid answer, "Superb teaching method of the teachers of the Mission is the key to my success. Also, I used to listen to the class attentively. Also I used to practice a lot. The teachers were very helpful. Last but not the least, Secretary Sir's encouraging talks boosted my morale a lot." One of her uncle, Asaduzzaman is a doctor and is an alumnus of Al-Ameen Mission. He is currently pursuing MD in Pediatrics from Aligarh Muslim University. Tahamina's uncle is an inspiration to everyone in Boro Natabari area. Four members of her family are studying in different residential Missions now. Presently, many students from that area have taken admission in various residential Missions in the state. They are being nurtured. Simply put, this is Al-Ameen effect. In future, Tahamina wants to study Chemistry and go on for research works.

Nazifa Nasrin who got 482 marks lives in a remote village, Bahirkap in Malda district. So far as ranking is concerned, she is in 11th position. Bahirkap is a place where one does not get either good schools or good teachers. Her father, himself a teacher, is ailing. Nazifa was admitted to class V in the Mission, Dhulian Branch. Later on, she was shifted to Uluberia from where she appeared for the HS exam. Nazifa dreams to become a doctor. We will now focus on few students, whose struggles will inspire our boys and girls in the days to come. The list is long. We can only pick some of them. First, Moumita Khatun. She comes from Dhokra, a village in North 24 Parganas. Her father, Asad Dhali is a small farmer, who cultivates one bigha of land. He has passed Madhyamik, while his wife Samsun Nahar read up to class VIII. Moumita got admitted in class V in the Patharchapuri campus of the Mission. She paid

nominal fees till Madhyamik. After that, she was exempted from paying fees. She appeared in the exam from the Uluberia branch and scored 92 per cent marks. She aims to become a doctor. Another student who also wants to be a doctor is **Md Ibnul Hasan**. He is from Sarberia, a remote village in North 24 Parganas. Although his father, AK Nuruzzaman was a primary teacher, he has lost his job because he is suffering from neurotic diseases. They have a small patch of land, which is providing their living. Ibnul's elder brother Md Imtiaz Hossain, who is an alumnus of Al-Ameen Mission, is studying medicine now. Ibnul too wants to follow his brother. Ibnul has scored 92 per cent marks. For **Julie Farhana**, who dares dreaming to be a doctor, the circumstance was rather dismal. Her father, Hossain Molla is a bus conductor. But, the Mission stands steadfastly beside Julie and she is aiming high. From class V, she is studying in the Mission and exempted from paying fees. She has scored 459 (91.8 per cent). **Ishak Ali** comes from Thanabari in Murshidabad. He has a big family of eight members. His father, Montaj Ali works as a bidi labourer. Ishak was admitted in the Mission in class-V. He has got 459 marks (91.8 per cent). After achieving this feat, with the help of the Mission, he is aiming to be a doctor or a physicist. We will end this tale by telling the story of **Farukh Abdulla**, a student from Baje Gopalnagar of Murshidabad district. His father, Golam Rasul is a farmer, having four bigha of land. Keeping all the adversities at bay, Farukh is determined to be a doctor. He has scored 443 (88.6 per cent) marks.

The results of JEE (Engineering) 2016 is also satisfactory. Within the first 15 thousand ranks, 110 students of the Mission have secured their places. These students, we hope, will get opportunities in good colleges. Within 5 thousand ranks, 41 students have made their way. Within 10 thousand ranks, 86 students have their name ranked. This year **Hasib Molla** has made the highest rank from among the Mission's students. He has ranked 388. Hasib is from Sarangpur village in Burdwan district. His father Rafik Molla is a farmer and mother Sahida Molla is a homemaker. Coming from a lower middle income group, he was admitted to class XI in the Burdwan branch of the Mission. He had paid one fourth of his fees in his three years study here (two years in HS and a year in JEE coaching). Hasib wants to study Computer Science in Jadavpur University. On the other hand, **Hasibul Islam** from Suryapur branch ranked 430. He is from Kalikahara village in Murshidabad. His father Ujir Sk and mother Samsunnahar Bibi are both illiterate. Ujir Sk is a small farmer. He has four sons and three daughters. It's really a daunting task to run this type of big family. But for the

Mission's help, Hasibul could not have dreamt to become an engineer. He came to the Mission in class XI and was admitted in the Dhuliyon branch. He got 85.6 per cent number in the HS examination and took free coaching from Suryapur branch. Hasibul too wants to study Computer Science from Jadavpur University.

Sariful Molla has ranked 435. His father, Abul Kalam Molla

is an illiterate and is an agricultural labourer. Coming from such a poor background, Sariful got two years of free coaching. One does not have to score brilliant results in Madhyamik and HS to perform better in JEE. This has been amply proved. Sariful got 60 per cent in Madhyamik and 68.8 per cent in the HS. But still, with steely determination and excellent coaching from the Mission he got the desired success. Another student,

Masum Iqbal has done well. He has ranked 589. He comes from Dhangora village of Malda. He got 88.6 per cent marks in HS in 2015. He wants to study electronics. **Sanjay Mondal**, ranked 885, comes from Arong Sarisha of Nadia. His father, Saidul Mondal who has studied till class VIII, is a small farmer. Sanjay is studying in the Mission from class V. Financial aid from the Mission has played a big role for

his dream come true. He wants to study Mechanical Engineering.

To make record and breaking it again to make newer record has become an unwritten norm in the annals of Al-Ameen Mission.

Let us see the statistics of 2016 JEE (Medical) of Al-Ameen Mission. Out of first 500 ranks, there are 66 students, within 1000 ranks the Mission has 162 students, within 1500 ranks there are 270 students, within 1750- 321 students, 2000 ranks-365 students, 2300 ranks- 421 students. This is indeed a mind boggling performance. Last year, in all of the medical colleges of the state nearly 20 per cent students are from the Mission. This is unprecedented, to say the least.

In 2015, when 297 students came under the rank of 2500, which was indeed a great feat, everyone was skeptical. To prove that this was not a flash in the pan, M Nurul Islam, the general secretary of the Mission with all humbleness said a single sentence at that time. He categorically said, "This feat will be repeated. Not only that, the number of students getting chance in JEE-Medical will grow." That his words will be proven so quickly was unimaginable.

This year all total 54889 students sat for the JEE (Medical). Out of which 12183 candidates were selected in the list. From this, nearly 2300 candidates have got the chance to study Medical from the general rank.

Among these 2300 meritorious students, Al-Ameen has, as has been mentioned above, 421 students.

It is impossible to write the achievement of all these successful candidates in this space. Instead, we will pick some random examples. Let us first speak about the highest ranker of the Mission. He is **Saifulla Shaikh**. He has ranked 40 in the state list. Saifulla lives in Gobindabati under Falta thana of South 24 Parganas. His father Montaj Sk, who has read till class V,

is a hawker. He has three sons and two daughters. Saifulla is the second among the siblings. His elder brother has begun working as a tailor. Saifulla, too, was destined to go this way. But one person did a remarkable thing which turned Saifulla's life in a different direction. He is Abdul Habib Molla, his maternal uncle. Saifulla, till Madhyamik, studied from his uncle's house. Habib Saheb took

Saifulla to Al-Ameen Mission and admitted him there in class XI. Saifulla got the opportunity to study in the Mission without paying any fees. In 2015, he passed the HS scoring 89.6 per cent. He sat for the JEE and ranked near 1800. He didn't take any admission. After preparing for a year, he scored this splendid result. His uncle told us he too wanted to study in the Mission. Back in 1999, he sat for the exam but fail to clear it. Now he is a para teacher. His nephew has now fulfilled his dream. One of his students is taking coaching from Al-Ameen Mission. He confessed candidly- 'there is no other place where poor children get such care except Al-Ameen Mission.'

The second highest ranker from the Mission is **Sk Md Habib**. His rank is 55. Habib comes from the village Kodalpur under Jangipara thana of Hooghly district. His father Sk Abdul Salim had studied little, so is her mother Basira Begum. She studied till class V. Abdul Salim is a tailor. He has a tailoring shop in Shillong, Meghalaya. He has always been particular about the studies of his

JEE coaching. Initially, his intention was to become an engineer. But when he came in the Mission, his intention changed and he began preparing for Medical Entrance. He faced some problem for this because he did not know much about Biology. That problem was mitigated through constant help from teachers and classmates. The environment of the Mission also gave him the advantage.

The third ranker from the Mission is **Nurnabi Khan**, whose rank is 62. As an OBC student, he has ranked 2 in the state. Nurnabi's home is in Chowki Mirdatpur village under Manikchowk thana of Malda district. Most of the inhabitants of his village are labourer and migrate to different districts of the country or even abroad. During cultivation, there is a chance to work as a daily wage earner but rest of the year one has to remain unemployed. So it is better to go abroad. The

percentage of educated people in that area is also low. Nurnabi's father Ghisu Khan spent most of the year in Delhi. He works as a daily labourer there. Nurnabi has been a student in the Mission from class V. He scored 84.2 per cent in the Madhyamik and in HS 85.4 per cent. After passing HS in 2014, he took coaching for a year and sat for JEE. In 2015, he ranked 2343. Again he took preparation with grit and in 2016

he achieved this stunning result. Nurnabi's father said that the Mission has given his son the opportunity to study there almost without fees.

Jahid Mondal ranked 69 in 2016 JEE (Medical). He is now studying in the Calcutta Medical College. He comes from village Magurkhali under Taherpur thana of Nadia. Jahid studied in Al-Ameen Mission, Panchur

campus from class- IX. Before that he studied in Rahmate Alam Mission from class-V and passed the Madhyamik exam from there scoring 91.1 % marks. He appeared for HS in 2016 and got 90.8% marks. His father Abdul Hamid Mondal is a mason and is working currently in Saudi Arabia while his mother Selima Mondal is a homemaker. He has an elder brother too. In future, he wants to get involved in research work.

In 2015, out of 2500, there were 297 students of the Mission. Among these 297 students, there were 42 girls. This number has increased significantly in 2016. There are 92 girls who have ranked within 2500. Let's talk about the first ranker among girls. She is **Safina Khatun**. Safina, as many would recall, came first among the students of Al-Ameen Mission in HS in 2015. She scored 93.4 per cent. This year she has ranked 77 in the JEE Medical. Safina had studied in the Mission from class XI and her attachment here changed her life considerably. She comes from Chatta-Kalikapur of South 24 Parganas, which is predominantly a garment hub. Safina's father Golam Md Sadik Mondal, who has studied till class VIII, is also a tailor. He also employs some labourers in this job. Safina has three sisters and two brothers. They have all studied in the local Subid Ali Institution. Although, there are lots of garments merchants here and many of them contribute large sums of money for the residential schools all around the state, the light of education has not reached well in that area. Instant success from garment business might be the reason for this. Many local boys to earn money, drop out of schools and get involved in the business. Significantly, the girls of that area are getting educated more and more. Safina is, no doubt, the representative of these girls.

Rajia Sultana has ranked 82. She comes from Daliapur village under Baishnabnagar Thana in Malda district. Rajia's father Md Mostafa could not pass the Madhyamik. He earns his living by bidi binding. Her mother too is illiterate. After household works, she too binds bidi. Rajia got admission to Al-Ameen Mission in class VIII. She got 91.1% in Madhyamik and in HS, she secured 91.2%. She took coaching for a year and has

ranked 82. Rajia has two brothers. One of them is studying in Al-Ameen Mission. He has scored 85 per cent in the HS and is now preparing for JEE. He too is taking coaching from the Mission.

The third ranker among the girls is **Sarmin Khatun**. Her rank is 88. She comes from Borokamat village under Baishnabnagar thana of Malda. Sarmin was admitted in the Mission in class XI. She passed HS in 2014 with 83 per cent marks and took two years coaching. She appeared for JEE in 2015 but had a low ranking. Sarmin's elder brother Waliul Islam has taken coaching from Al-Ameen Mission and is now a third year MBBS student. Both brother and sister have got special financial concession from the Mission and have reached the door to success. Sarmin's father Safikul Islam had passed Madhyamik and run a small grocery store. Her mother Aktara Bibi had read till class VIII. She too in her spare time binds bidi. Imagine, after some years, this family will get two doctors. Their financial condition will improve tremendously. There will be a significant change- a change towards betterment courtesy Al-Ameen Mission. Safikul Saheb informed us that in 2016 Sarmin's four classmates have got chance in Medical. Four have already passed out and nearly 30 boys and girls are getting ready to study medicine from nearby areas.

Miron Shah is a first year medical student at Calcutta Medical College. He comes from Hariharpara, Murshidabad. His father Ibrahim Shah has a small business in the locality. He had read till class VIII. Miron's mother Hasina Khatun Bibi is a graduate and is an ICDS worker. Miron primary schooling was done in Sishu Niketan and then he studied in Hariharpara High School from class VI and passed Madhyamik in 2012 from there securing 83.3 per cent marks. Then he got admitted to Al-Ameen Mission Khalatpur campus where he passed the HS in 2014 with 79 per cent marks. After taking coaching in the free coaching scheme, he ranked 140 in JEE Medical. He is all praise for Al-Ameen Mission. He admits that he wanted to be an engineer at first. But after coming to the Mission his perception changed. The coaching in the Mission has taught him, how to crack JEE. He wants to be a neurologist.

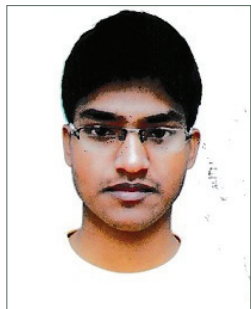

Mehedi has an elder brother who is studying civil engineering at present. She was in Khalatpur unit under free-coaching scheme. She wants to be a gynecologist in future.

Sagir Hossain ranked 348 in the JEE (Medical) last year. He is now the student in the first year of MBBS at Nilratan Sirkar Medical College & Hospital. Sagir is from North Bengal. He comes from a village called Jibrannarkuthi in the district of Coochbehar. His father is also a farmer and cultivates his 4 bigha paddy field. His mother, who had passed Madhyamik, cooks Mid-day meal in the local school, Raja Bijoy Singh Vidyamandir. Incidentally, Sagir was a student of this school from class V to XII. In the Madhyamik exam, he scored 86.87 per cent marks whereas in HS his percentage of marks was 75 per cent. He took coaching in the free coaching scheme of Al-Ameen Mission. In future, he wants to specialize in Cardiology.

But inspite of the poverty, Maskura and her two sisters have not stopped their studies. She was a meritorious girl. Her tutor used to buy books and writing copies. Because both of her parents were busy, she used to do all the household works. Whatever little time she got after that, she used to spend it on her study. In 2013, she passed the Madhyamik from Chandrakona Islamia High Madrasa with 76% marks. The teachers began telling Maskura not to take Science. They also said that it is expensive to study in that stream. But her mathematics teacher took the initiative to take her to Al-Ameen Mission. She sat for the admission test and was selected. Maskura began her study without paying any fees. Initially, she could not understand her subjects well. But gradually she overcame this problem and in 2015 she passed the HS with 84.4% marks. Maskura also took the coaching from Al-Ameen Mission in the free coaching scheme. She worked hard and had ranked 830. She is studying in the Sagar Dutta Medical College, Kamarhati. Maskura is grateful to Al-Ameen Mission for giving her the key by which she has unlocked the door to success.

Now we will discuss about a girl who is meritorious but comes from a relatively poor family. **Paira Khatun** is from Bhagabanpur village of Murshidabad. When she was in class IV, her father died, leaving three sons and two daughters. Her father was daily labourer. After he passed away, the whole family went disarray. Paira's mother became a bidi worker and her elder brother a daily labourer. Both of them worked hard and helped Paira to continue her study. They did not let Paira stop her study and become a bidi worker. Paira was meritorious and passed her Madhyamik with 66 per cent from her village school. She got admitted in class XI in Al-Ameen Mission. Her dream run started. In HS, she obtained 76.4 per cent. In the JEE (Medical), she has ranked 841. Hearing the news, her mother's eyes well up. Tears roll down her cheek-tears of joy. Her fight has not gone in vain. Paira will be a doctor. Six years from now, after passing out she will come and will keep her hand on her mother's hand. That hand, which has become hard and callus because of binding bidis, will feel the touch of a soft but assuring hand. That assuring hand knows the fight the hard and callus hand had fought. Al-Ameen stands beside these countless families who are fighting for survival. Al-Ameen Mission has received many prizes and felicitations for its contribution in the field of education but this 'tears of joy' of a mother is, perhaps, unparalleled.

We will narrate some random stories here. **Fahim Uddin Laskar** got the chance of studying in Al-Ameen Mission after three attempts. First during admission in class V, second time to get admission in VII and third time in class XI. In 2014, he passed the HS from Al-Ameen Mission with 79 per cent marks. He sat for JEE that year and

From class IX to XII, he studied free of cost from Al-Ameen Foundation. He passed his HS in 2012. In 2016, he has ranked 1128. In between he tried to crack the examination but could not. But he took coaching from various coaching centres of Al-Ameen Mission.

tural field to run the family. Because of his work he could not attend school regularly. But still he got 626 marks in the Madhyamik. After that he gave admission test in Al-Ameen Mission and got selected. At the time of interview, Nurul Islam came to know of their financial trouble. He exempted all the fees. He continued his studies with the assistance and help from the teachers and classmates. He was studying from the Bardhaman branch of the Mission. He has ranked 1076. Candidly, he said that without Mission it is impossible for an orphan like him to study medicine.

We will finish this section with **Sk Hasan** who has ranked 105. Hasan's father Sk Badre Alam has studied till class IV, while his mother is an illiterate and is a homemaker. His father is a farmer. Hasan comes from village Jinkara under Indus thana of Bankura. He has a sister and a brother. Her sister is a graduate and his brother studies in the first year at Surendranath Evening College. In the daytime he works for a food catering company. Hasan studied in the Mission in the HS and took coaching for five years. The Mission gave him special exemption for it. Interestingly, all these information were given by Sk Ataur Rahaman. Ataur happens to be Hasan's local guardian. He provides all the financial support to Hasan. He is also his cousin. He owns the food catering company, where Hasan's younger brother works. But the story does not end here. Ataur too was a student of Al-Ameen Mission. He is an alumnus. He too has to work in the field where the laborious job callused his hand. Ataur's father was mentally instable. Al-Ameen Mission gave Ataur the platform to flourish by sending him to study management in Delhi. He is very fond of food. So after passing the management he opened his catering business. His financial condition is stable and he is also helping his cousins now. Once upon a time

Al-Ameen Mission has nurtured scores of students. Most of them belong to very poor families. Tahmina-Nazifa-Julie-Ibnul-Ishak-Farukh- each one of them is now raring to go and conquer the peak.

English Medium at Panchur
